THE FACTS

- 60% of New York City students are immigrants or children of immigrants.
- Immigrants account for 43% of city residents in the labor force, however they occupy lower wage jobs in manufacturing, construction, and service industries.
- Lack of English proficiency and education directly correlate with the percentage of immigrant New Yorkers who live in poverty.
- Only 5-10% of undocumented students who graduate from high school go onto college, versus approximately 75% of their peers

OUR MISSION

To enable and encourage higher education and professional achievement for the immigrant community.

WHAT DIFFERENTIATES US

- 1. We make a time and capital intensive commitment to our scholars: Our awards are between \$2,500 and \$20,000, and we enroll all Ascend Educational Fund Scholars in an intensive academic and professional Mentorship Program.
- 2. We serve all immigrant students regardless of national origin, ethnicity and immigration status: Most college scholarships limit their awards on the basis of ethnicity and immigration status. We target and serve all immigrants, from Bolivian to Japanese, from citizen to non-citizen.



Letter from our chairman

Dear AEF Friends & Supporters,

Happy New Year from all of us at the Ascend Educational Fund! As our first AEF Scholars begin their second semester in college, thanks to your generous support, I want to take this opportunity to review AEF's amazing inaugural year, and to share where we are headed for the 2014 scholarship season.

New York City has one of the most diverse immigrant populations in the nation, and while immigrant students graduate high school at a higher rate than their native-born peers, immigrants occupy lower wage jobs. A lack of education directly correlates with the percentage of immigrant New Yorkers who live in poverty.

AEF was officially founded a little more than a year ago on October 4, 2012 with a straightforward mission—to enable and encourage higher education and professional achievement for the immigrant community. Regardless of ethnicity, national origin or immigration status, we envision every exceptional student in New York City as having the same educational and professional opportunities.

Our inaugural year surpassed our expectations; with over 200 supporters attending our launch event in February, AEF being selected to participate in Cocktails for Causes (which raised funds for an additional scholarship), and raising over \$9,000 during our gift-matching drive in May.

We received over 325 applications, and over 40 selection committee members helped select our 2013 Scholars. We awarded \$32,000 in Scholarships, 60% more than our initial \$20,000 goal.

Our proudest achievement, however, is our inaugural class of AEF Scholars, who embody the diversity and perseverance of our immigrant community. Our seven AEF Scholars were awarded a total of \$32,000, or 81% of raised funds.^a They are citizens and non-citizens, some attending Ivy League colleges, others starting at community colleges, and representing countries such as Bangladesh, China and Mexico.

Our Scholars were paired with committed mentors who will provide advice and serve as a sounding board during their college years. Our mentors officially met their mentees at our first annual picnic, which was attended by our Advisory Council and the Scholars' families.

As I reflect on our inaugural year, it is not possible to imagine we would have come this far without the help of the Esperanza Educational Fund, our Advisory Council (Danny Chang, Arthur Li, & Raphael Zagury), and every single one of our volunteers.

The 2013 scholarship season is just the start for AEF. As the plans for 2014 season begin to unfold, I am excited for the possibilities. We will host our first annual gala on February 8, 2014, and we intend to increase the number of applications and award amounts by 50% in 2014, among other goals. I invite you to browse our full 2013 Annual Review.



^a We intended to award \$36,000 (90% of funds raised) and originally selected eight Scholars. However, one of the selected recipients became ineligible prior to entering college in Fall 2013. The funds from the withdrawn scholarship will be awarded in 2014.



Timeline: Key 2013 events




The AEF selection process

AEF scholars were selected based on qualities traditionally valued and demonstrated by the immigrant community: hard work, resourcefulness, perseverance in the face of adversity, academic achievement, leadership, and commitment to one's community. All candidates submitted an application including two required essays on (1) Describe your academic and career goals and how a scholarship from Ascend Educational Fund will help you achieve those goals, and (2) Describe how your experience as an immigrant or a child of immigrants has affected your life and how it will contribute to your future success.

Over 1,000 applications were opened online, and 327 completed applications were submitted. Our Selection Committee selected the top 20 candidates to interview in person, which were conducted in mid-May. In the end, 6% of applicants received an interview, and we selected eight scholars representing Mexico, Bangladesh, China, Guyana and the West Indies.^a

Our finalists represented all five boroughs of Manhattan:

Meet our inaugural 2013 AEF Scholars



A civil rights activist whose parents emigrated from **Bangladesh** and attends Princeton University. This **Danaus Awesome Achievement Award** recipient has spent her teenage years supporting the struggle for human rights and social activism throughout the world by organizing hate-crime rallies, promoting voter rights, and starting a tutorial center in her house for free. Not only did she maintain a 4.0 GPA in high school and is a true leader in her community, she also contributes her earnings from the summer employment program to her parents to assist her family with their basic needs.

An immigrant from **Mexico** who is a founding member of a diversity group that promotes tolerance and anti-bullying at her school, and attends Hunter College with plans to study Psychology and Education. This **El Aguila Perseverance Award** recipient dedicates herself to her schoolwork as an International Baccalaureate diploma candidate with a 100 average, while continuing to help her guardians pay the bills by selling ices and cupcakes.

A young research scientist whose parents emigrated from **China** and who attends The University of California, Davis. His accomplishments include performing at Carnegie Hall, a national ranking in Chess the last three years, and being a member of his high school's varsity fencing team since his freshman year. Despite his demanding academic and extracurricular schedule, he also plays the role of homemaker in his household: purchasing groceries, making dinners and taking care of his siblings.

A student devoted to women's rights and gender equality whose parents emigrated from **Guyana**, and attends Wellesley College. Despite her economic and personal struggles, she maintained an A average at one of the country's most rigorous high schools. She was a head counselor at Project HAPPY, a sports and recreational program for individuals with disabilities, as well as an advocate for the Asian American youth community with the Coalition for Asian American Children & Families.

A young woman who immigrated to the U.S. from **Mexico** five years ago, and graduated in the top 10% of her class, and earned a 4 on the Advanced Placement English Language & Composition exam, despite being enrolled in ESL classes her freshman year. This **Arthur Li Distinguished Rising Star Award** was a member of a rigorous college-preparatory program, an alto sax player, and a committed volunteer at her church. She attends CUNY's John Jay College of Criminal Justice and is passionately seeking a career as a criminal detective.



A women rights advocate whose parents emigrated from **St. Kitts and Nevis** and attends Bryn Mawr College. She founded a women's empowerment group in her school to discuss race, body image, and women's rights. A member of the Sadie Nash Leadership Project, she maintained an A average and ranked in the top 12% of her graduating class. She is described by her teachers as "a more honest, generous, and determined individual than you will ever meet."

A young man who immigrated to the U.S from **Mexico**, and maintained a 3.7 GPA at one of New York City's most competitive high schools, and scored in the 83rd percentile on the SAT mathematics section, all while working as a cook's assistant, assistant super, and at McDonald's to help support his family. He is described by his teachers as "one of the most ambitious, giving, and thirsty for knowledge" students they have ever encountered. He attends City College of New York.



Summary of key 2013 events

Launch event- February 27, 2013

AEF hosted its official launch event on Wednesday, February 27, 2013 at the Ainsworth Park in Gramercy. The night was a huge success, with more than \$4,000 raised and over 160 participants gathered to learn about AEF and our efforts to enable and encourage higher education and professional achievement for the immigrant community in New York City.

Participants learned about the numerous opportunities to become involved in AEF including (1) joining the Board of Advisors and help set the fundraising strategy while having a scholarship named in their honor, while also being highly encouraged to raise or contribute \$2,500, (2) joining the Scholarship Committee and assist in selecting scholars by reading applications and conducting interviews, (3) joining the Mentorship Committee and set the programming for the mentorship effort, or (4) becoming a mentor.

AEF also recognized a few individuals who were instrumental in helping launch the fund: Lilian Jallagaes, Rebekka Bonner, and Amy Hundert, who provided countless hours of advice and support. A special thanks was given to the Esperanza Educational Fund, who has inspired the work of AEF.









Cocktails for Causes- March 26, 2013

On Tuesday, March 26, 2013 AEF participated in a fundraising event, *Cocktails for Causes*, with four other non-profits supporting the NYC community, hosted by the Alchemy Club. The event took place at the Dream Downtown Hotel in Chelsea. The night was a huge success, with \$2,800 in funds raised for AEF.



AEF Mentor Picnic- June 23, 2013

AEF hosted its first official Mentor Picnic on Sunday, June 23, 2013 at New York City's Central Park. Our first class of AEF Scholars were introduced to his/her mentor and the group spent the afternoon playing games and icebreakers to get to know each other in teams. Scholars were also invited to bring family members, and our Board of Directors and other supporters had the opportunity to speak with our scholars' family and friends in a fun and informal environment.

Julissa Arce, chairman of the Board, congratulated each of the scholars and reiterated the importance of mentorship throughout their college years and subsequent careers. Adrienne Serrato and Anna Liu, cochairs of the Mentorship Committee, conducted an orientation for mentors prior to the picnic to introduce the mentors to each other and assist in the development and maintenance of the mentor/mentee relationship. The afternoon allowed AEF the chance to celebrate each of our scholars with their families, introduce the AEF mentors to their mentees, and establish a foundation for the scholars and mentors to develop a meaningful connection.





Partner event with the Dr. Antonia Pantoja Fellowship Inc. (DAPF) - November 14, 2013

On Thursday, November 14, AEF hosted its first partner event with The Dr. Antonia Pantoja Fellowship, Inc. (DAPF) with a November Happy Hour at EVR Lounge in midtown Manhattan. The event gathered close to 100 DAPF and AEF supporters and raised \$2,700 toward academic scholarships, or \$1,350 for each organization for 2014 awards. During the event, AEF leadership highlighted the success in 2013 with an inaugural class of seven AEF scholars, and discussed plans for the first annual gala on February 8, 2014. DAPF discussed its focus on promoting the development of Puerto Rican and Latino/a leaders of integrity in the NYC community, and also highlighted plans for a Carnivale celebration on March 4, 2014. We look forward to continuing our success with other partner organization events in 2014 and beyond.
